As you know, Westwind is a special place. Situated within the larger Cascade Head Biosphere Reserve, Westwind's 529 acres feature the iconic landscapes of the Oregon Coast: headland meadows, dense Sitka Spruce and Hemlock rainforest, a dynamic estuary, and the unparalleled beaches and rocky shores of the Pacific Ocean.

The Westwind Stewardship Group is charged with protecting Westwind's ecosystems and providing educational and inspirational experiences for children, families and private groups. Overnights at Westwind allows up to 145 people to experience a deeply unique connection with nature. .

All of the things that make Westwind special can also be a challenge for group leaders when planning for a stay onsite. Westwind's isolation and our emphasis on stewardship require each group leader, and all guests, to learn about and respect our basic guidelines for staying at Westwind.

It is important that each member of the group be made aware of these guidelines for a successful stay at Westwind.

Meander through upland meadows. Study marine life in coastal tide pools. Discover hidden lakes and babbling streams. This and more await you during a stay at Westwind.

ABOUT WESTWIND



Westwind is a 529 acre camp and wilderness area set in the middle of the Cascade Head UN Biosphere Reserve in Oregon. Owned and operated by the Westwind Stewardship Group, Westwind is home to Camp Westwind, the Northwest Outdoor Science School, workshops, events and volunteer programs.

Our Vision

All children have access to wild and undeveloped landscapes and are allowed to discover the interconnection, complexity and splendor of living in balance with natural systems.

Our Mission

Conserve the Westwind site in perpetuity; foster life-changing outdoor experiences for all children, families and groups; and promote environmental stewardship as a basis for sustainable living.

What We Do

Westwind offers the following programs:

- **Camp Westwind sessions** (youth, teen, family) during the summer and in the fall.
- Stewardship programs include stewardship weekends, and other volunteer/service learning projects.
- Workshops & Events connect participants to practical knowledge about sustainability, stewardship and living lightly on the land.
- Rental programs allow individuals, families and non-profit organizations to stay at Westwind in various accommodations for two or more nights.

Westwind Facilities

Wilson Lodge – Historic lodge includes a large dining hall, two meeting rooms.

McIver Lodge & Dormitory – This accessible facility includes 4 rooms with 1 set of bunk beds and 2 single beds each (twin size mattress), 2 shared bathrooms/accessible showers, 2 meeting rooms, rock wall fireplaces and home-style kitchen. Sleeps a maximum of 16 people.

Camper Cabins – 13 rustic, electric heated cabins with lights and outlets that sleep up to 9 each (except for Vi's Place, a large rustic cabin that sleeps up to 16 with wood stove, lights and outlets). Beds are bunk bed style.

Cascade Head – Main shower and bath facilities located next to Wilson Lodge. Flush toilets, showers and sinks. Accessible. **Wyeast** – Small heated 1-bedroom cabin including king bed, kitchen, bathroom, living room with fireplace and bay window overlooking the Pacific Ocean. Sleeps maximum 5 people (pull-

Ridge – Stand alone cabin with Bedroom (queen size bed), kitchen, bathroom, living room with woodstove and 2 twin beds separated by pull-curtains. Sleeps maximum 5 people.

Trillium – Stand alone studio style cabin with queen size bed, kitchenette and bathroom. Sleeps maximum 2 people.

Group & Cabin Rental Packages

Westwind Package: Use of Wilson lodge, 13 camper cabins, McIver Dormitory and Lodge, Cascade Head & Wyeast cabin. This package includes exclusivity of overnight rental. Base Rate: Non profit \$3075/night, Private \$4350/night, 2-night minimum, sleeps maximum of 145.

Wilson Package: Use of Wilson lodge, 13 camper cabins & Cascade Head. There may be another group renting other packages during your stay.

Base Rate: Non profit \$2,175/night, Private \$3,200/night, 2-night minimum, sleeps maximum of 120.

McIver Package: McIver Dormitory and Lodge. There may be another group renting other packages during your stay. Base Rate: Non profit \$775/night, Private \$1,050/night, 2-night minimum, sleeps maximum of 16.

Wyeast Cabin: Available as a standalone rental on a space available basis. *Base Rate: \$245/night, 2-night minimum,*

sleeps maximum of 5.

Ridge Cabin: Available as a standalone rental on a space available basis. *Base Rate: \$245/night, 2-night minimum, sleeps maximum of 5.*

Trillium Cabin: Available as a standalone rental on a space available basis. *Base Rate:* \$125/night, 2-night minimum, sleeps maximum of 2.

Wedding Package Includes: Use of Wilson Lodge, sleeping cabins, McIver Lodge & Dormitory, Wyeast and Cascade Head, 2 additional staff to assist with dishes and other site needs. *Base Rate:* \$6,250/night, 2-night minimum.

WESTWIND BASICS

Stewardship

Stewardship at Westwind means conserving the landscape and living lightly. It means sweeping cabins and cleaning the common spaces. It means chipping in with dishwashing, wiping down tables or leading a beach clean-up. It means a lot of volunteer work around the site, during programs and throughout the year.

It means Westwind's many supporters donating time, money and wisdom to the forever-project of keeping Westwind strong, healthy and wild. At its core, stewardship means leaving Westwind better than you found it.

Recycling

Recycling is a large part of Westwind, but we are limited. Our system is different from what you might find in Portland or a larger city. Please take extra care when recycling and ensure you are only putting what is actually recyclable into Westwind's recycling bins. Westwind has specific containers marked for the following:

- Co-Mingled Recycling: Paper (scratch paper, magazines, cereal boxes, newspaper; nothing shredded or small), plastic (#1 & #2) Jugs only (must have a neck), tin cans, and aluminum cans. Sorry we can not recycle paper towels.
- Corrugated Cardboard (no wax covering)
- Glass bottles

Feel free to pack-in/pack-out other recyclables if you have the capacity to recycle other products. Lincoln County is restricted to above items only.

Compost

Waste reduction is an important part of stewardship at Westwind. All food items are compostable here. In the dining hall you will find green buckets. Please dispose of all your food waste and tea bags in the green buckets.nce full, they will be taken to our compost pile and used in our gardens.

Goats and Chickens

Here at Westwind, we have 2 Goats - Daisy and Dobby and 6 Chickens - Mama Hen, Cool Dude, Skippy, Chicken-Bro, Peaches and Cream. From our kitchen, we save scrap fruits, vegetables and grains to help with their diet and mitigate food waste. You are more than welcome to pet the goats and chickens, and if you speak with camp staff, they may let you help feed them.

Landfill

At Westwind, we are dedicated to limiting the amount of waste that goes to the Landfill. This is where we need your help! Landfills are for un-recyclable plastic (bags, packaging), cardboard (covered with wax) and any other synthetic material (plastic, foam, paper board, metal) that does not have a market for reuse or recycling.

Conservation

Please use only the power and water you need. Unplug chargers when not in use, turn off lights, and make sure

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heaters are off completely when you leave a cabin. Use only the water you need (no need to add to the wonderful sound of the ocean with the sound of a running faucet!). Please report all dripping faucets, toilets, or other water-related leaks.

Cleaning

All groups are required to clean after their stay, and leave Westwind at least as clean as when you arrived. This includes but is not limited to cleaning all restroom and shower facilities, sweeping and mopping floors, cleaning kitchen facilities and taking out all garbage, & recycling. A complete list will be provided for your group. A "walk through" inspection will be conducted at the end of your stay with a member of your group and a member of the Westwind site staff.

Wifi and Cell Phones

Westwind is located in a remote area and cell phone service is extremely limited and not guaranteed. There are a few locations around camp where you can find a signal. We do not provide wifi for guest access.

Camp Store

You will love Camp Westwind so much that you will want the gear to show it! We can open our camp store during your stay, so you may purchase Westwind gear: T-shirts, sweatshirts, hats, beanies, postcards, sweatpants, stuffed critters, animals local to camp, cups, stickers, and more! Please arrange a time with Guest Services before your stay for a scheduled time to open the store.. All proceeds from our camp store go to our campership fund, helping people come to camp. Basics Rules

We ask all groups to be mindful of a few basic rules when staying at Westwind:

- All local, state and federal laws must be obeyed.
- Legal consumption of alcoholic beverages is allowed, but only in moderation.
- All medication should be stored under lock except when in the controlled possession of the person responsible for administering them.
- No weapons or fireworks allowed on site.
- No pets allowed...
- Smoking is prohibited in all buildings and throughout the property except in the

- designated smoking area. Marijuana is not allowed on camp property.
- Furniture must not be moved out of buildings without permission from site staff.
- No candles or open flame except in fireplaces and designated campfire areas.
- Never hesitate to ask Westwind staff or designated site hosts for help with Westwind buildings and systems.

Supervision of Children

If the group includes children under age 18 without a parent, we recommend the following ratios of adult leaders/supervisors (18 years of age or older) to children in residence:

Age of Children	Adult to child ratio
4-5 years	1:5
6-8 years	1:6
9-14 years	1:8
15-17 years	1:10

At a minimum, we require a 1:10 ratio for adults to children (under age 18). We strongly recommend that the sponsoring organization complete background checks on all adults or teens who supervise children, and that the group follow a general policy of not being one-on-one with a child who is not your own (or otherwise related). If you have families within your group, please stress to the parents the importance of supervising all children during the stay. There are many ways a child could be seriously hurt or lost if not supervised. For minors without a parent on site, signed permission to seek emergency treatment or a signed religious waiver is required.

Vehicles

Use of the Westwind access road is extremely limited. Guest groups are allowed a maximum of two cars in camp:

- One Emergency Vehicle for use relating to emergency circumstances within the group and/or for transporting mobility-challenged guests into/out of camp.
- One Service Vehicle for transporting supplies that may include food and various event supplies.

Per Westwind's Emergency Evacuation Plan, every vehicle must be backed into the appropriate parking spot. Transportation of passengers in non-passenger vehicles is prohibited. Once in camp these vehicles must remain parked in the designated parking area by the Shop until departure. Westwind does not allow in and out road use except for emergencies.

Site Access

Currently access to Westwind is only done via our emergency access road, The Rainforest Trail, which is a one-way, 2.5 mile gravel road. Please maintain a speed limit of 10 mph when driving on the road. Your group will park at the Fraser Field Parking area located about .5 miles passed the black gate. All members of your group will be required to hike into/out of Westwind using the Rainforest Trail. Westwind will provide a luggage truck to assist with luggage at the Field Parking Lot area. Please remind your group to carry any items that will be needed right away like medications, water bottles, or jackets. All able-bodied adults and children are asked to walkin. If members of your group have special accessibility requirements, proper arrangements should be made ahead of time with the Guest Services Manager.

As a general rule, check-in time is 3:00 pm and check-out time is 11:00 am. Please coordinate with the Guest Services Manager if your group requires an alternative schedule. Arrival times are based on many different factors. Safety being the most important. Arrivals must be at least 1-hour before sunset to ensure proper daylight for hiking in. Any arrivals that arrive after sunset will not be allowed entruntil the following morning at 9:00 am. If late arrivals occur, they will be responsible for hiking in with their luggage.

Travel on the road outside your agreed upon arrival and departure times is prohibited. Please help your group to stick to the established check in/out times. In the event that you need to use the road outside of these times, please coordinate with Westwind Staff.

Quiet Hours

10:00 pm - 8:00 am. Please be courteous and abide by these hours. Please, out of respect for our neighbors and the public, no loud music or other noise that would carry out to the river.

Decorating

Staples, tacks, pins, or strong adhesive tape may NOT be used on any surfaces including walls, glass, tables, windows, or doors. Masking tape only may be used sparingly. We are not able to provide ladders, tools, extension cords, etc. All decorations must be taken down and removed. Westwind

strongly discourages the use of unsustainable disposable decorations.

Use of the Westwind Kitchen

If the group will be preparing their own meals, at least one person with a valid Oregon Food Handler's Card must be present at all times the kitchen is in use. One person must be designated to ensure that food preparation, serving and storage complies with the Oregon Health Division (OHD) Food Sanitation Rules. More detailed information on kitchen use will be provided upon arrival or request

Advance arrangements must be made for arrival and departure of any outside caterers. Our kitchen includes all the dinnerware needed to serve meals. Please do not bring disposable dinnerware such as paper plates and plastic silverware. If you are using Westwind's catering service, the kitchen is off limits with the exception of the Galley and Dish Pit areas.

Orientation and Emergency Procedures

Westwind staff will provide a mandatory safety orientation to your group immediately following your arrival. Westwind's remote and isolated location means we are our own first line of defense in case of an emergency. The orientation includes site-specific information on tsunami, fire, earthquake and wildlife safety. Westwind has established an emergency cache of supplies to sustain a full camp in the wake of a major disaster. Please report all emergencies to the site staff immediately.

Security Deposit

A Security Deposit is required for all reservations, and will be refunded within six weeks following your stay at Westwind. The Security Deposit (or a portion) will be retained if guests do not abide by Westwind policies and procedures in the Westwind Guest Handbook. Westwind may also seek additional funds for damages not covered by the deposit.

Insurance

As a group, you must have liability insurance with minimally a \$1,000,000.00 liability and a \$2,000,000.00 aggregate coverage, listing Camp Westwind as an additional certificate holder. Westwind must have a copy of this on file before your group arrives. The address on the certificate should be Camp Westwind, 7500 N. Fraser Rd, Otis, Or, 97368

Nurse / First Aid Requirements/ Medications

Your group is required to have, minimally, a certified First Aid/CPR/AED person who is designated to be the point person(s) in case of minor accidents, illness, or distribution of medications for minors. A current license in the state of Oregon nurse or doctor is preferred. Westwind must receive a copy of the certification on file. Groups with minors without parents present must keep all medications locked and secured according to the Oregon Health Department and American Camp Association (ACA) guidelines. Each group is responsible for bringing basic first aid supplies for their camp stay. Any major accidents/incidents/illness that requires outside medical attention, authorities, or departure of campers must be reported to Westwind Staff.

Camp Fires / Beach Fires

Outdoor fires may be built in established fire circles only with the approval of Westwind staff. A shovel and bucket of water must be readily available at each outdoor fire. Oregon law allows for small recreational beach fires, provided they are located in the open dry sands area, downwind of and below the beach grass and driftwood line; no fires are allowed in dunes or beach log accumulations.

Dogs / Pets

Renters and other guests may not bring pets to Westwind. This is for human and animal safety as well as ecological sustainability. Please note that dogs live on-site and will be leashed when a group is in camp.

Drinking water

The water from all taps and faucets at camp is potable (drawn from Westwind's dunal well). Water quality is tested routinely. Please do not bring bottled water to camp; instead, bring your reusable bottle and enjoy some of the PNW's best water!

RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Beach Combing & Tide pooling

The rocks at the south end of the ocean beach provide spectacular tide pooling opportunities during low tide. Consult the tide chart for low tide times during your visit. Please be respectful to our friends at the beach. Please leave all living creatures in the tide pools. Tread lightly and avoid damaging barnacles and rock habitats. Please do not enter caves, climb on rocks or stand near unstable cliffs.

Beach Safety Guidelines:

- Never turn your back on the ocean.
- Watch out for sneaker waves.
- Stay alert for logs being washed in by large waves.
- Never climb on driftwood to avoid incoming tidal
- Westwind strongly recommends no ocean or river swimming. The water is dangerously cold, subject to strong rip currents and can be very unpredictable.
- Westwind strongly recommends a certified lifeguard on duty for aquatic activities.
- We encourage everyone to follow these safety guidelines though oceans and rivers in Oregon are public.

Hiking

High Meadow Trail: A one mile trail that begins at the top of the Highlands Unit and follows the cliff towards Lost Lake, Fern Gully, and eventually High Meadow and Potato Bug Point. This trail provides spectacular views of the ocean and travels through several biospheres in our diverse coastal rainforest. Once you reach High Meadow, look north towards Cascade Head and Westwind beach and south to Lincoln City. It is a great place to try and spot whales and optimal for catching a sunset. The trail is very steep in places and can be slick at times. Watch for exposed roots and please follow the signs.

Difficulty: Moderate/Hard.

Rainforest Trail: A two mile trail (and Westwind's graveled emergency access road) begins at the NE corner of Wilson Lodge and features spectacular views of the estuary and some of the biggest trees at Westwind. If you reach the end of the trail before turning back, you'll find our Fraser Farm and site staff housing.. Keep an eye out for elk in the estuary and cars traveling through. Difficulty: Beginner.

Ranch Hill: This .75 to 1 mile long trail begins either at our Tillicum barn or a short walk down the Rainforest Trail. From both locations, it gradually travels uphill through a shore pine forest to an impressive mosaic of Spruce, Hemlock, and Fir trees and has plenty of space for a nice picnic if it's not too windy. Just under a quarter mile away from Tillicum lies a short offshoot to our famous Octopus Tree - a huge Spruce tree with an exposed root system. Be mindful of exposed roots. Difficulty: Moderate.

River Estuary Trail/Spit Walk: Starting at Wilson Lodge, head north down the River Trail towards the estuary. Once at the estuary, turn left and travel west towards the ocean, following the Salmon River that marks our northern border. The trail is often muddy due to tides and is best hiked during a mid-low tide. Continue following the river towards the spit the area where the river starts to widen as it joins the ocean. Keep an eye out for sea lions resting on the beach. Continue down the beach and loop back towards the main camp. It is not uncommon to see bald eagles, blue heron, seals and sea lions, killdeer, and the occasional river otter. In the early morning or evening you may also spot deer, raccoon, and possibly elk or a lone coyote. Difficulty: Beginner

Old Baldy: This trail connects the Alpine and Highlands cabin areas with the High Meadow trail and can be found on the Highland-Alpine trail. Old Baldy trail follows a back ridgeline that looks into Westwind's backwoods and is covered in berries and impressive biodiversity. The trail gradually winds up and joins with the trail leading up to High Meadow or back down to the Highlands cabin area. Roughly .75 to 1 miles. Difficulty: Moderate.

Lost Lake Trail: Follow the High Meadow Trail to the Lost Lake sign and turn left to reach our six-acre freshwater lake hidden in Westwind's backwoods. This is an out-and-back trail. Be mindful of wet soil underfoot and exposed roots. Keep an eye out for wildlife and enjoy the old growth forest that surrounds the lake. Difficulty: Moderate.

Wysong Corridor: This trail connects the High Meadow and Rainforest trails and travels through a beautiful area surrounded by Douglas Fir. Length is .25 miles. Difficulty: Moderate.

The Point: To reach one of Westwind's closest and most accessible viewpoints as well as our tsunami evacuation location, follow the trail to the Highlands cabin area and, just before turning towards the cabins, stay straight instead and head due west to The Point. You'll see a wooden cache on the

trail to your right that holds all of our emergency supplies and our emergency water at the top as well. This used to be the site of a Craft House over twenty years ago and now serves as a beautiful view of the beach and ocean, an excellent place to hang a hammock, and an optimal spot to watch the sunset. Difficulty: Moderate.

PROGRAM OPPORTUNITIES

Westwind has various programming opportunities that can be molded to fit your group's individual needs. All program opportunities must be arranged in advance with the Guest Services Manager.

Canoes and Kayaks

Boats are available for rent from Westwind but must be arranged ahead of time with the Guest Services Manager. A certified and skilled lifeguard employed by Westwind must be present while Wetwind's kayaks and canoes are in use. Groups may bring their own boats and gear as well. Use of personal equipment while at Westwind is at your own risk (and state laws must be followed with regards to small craft safety and use of personal floatation devices). Westwind strongly recommends that a certified lifeguard is present with your group during personal waterfront activities and encourages everyone to follow these safety guidelines but oceans and rivers in Oregon are public. Westwind also strongly recommends a certified instructor for watercraft activities.

Archery

Archery is a program that can be added to your reservation, depending on the availability of our certified and skilled instructors. We provide all equipment and safety instructions. Closed toe shoes are required for this activity.

Pricing: \$10 per person \$150 minimum

Challenge Course (Low Ropes/Team Building)

Our low ropes challenge course is a great way to create team building opportunities as well as some fun experiences. Closed toe shoes are required for this activity.

Helpful Timeline and Hints For A Successful Camp

At lease	e one month prior:
	Recruit luggage crew to load and unload luggage
	Verify child supervision ratio of at least 1 adult for every 8 children.
	Create cabin assignments (request a cabin assignment form from Westwind)
	Confirm details with any outside vendors (guest speakers, caterers, etc.) and communicate relevant arrival and departure times with the Guest Services Manager.
At leas	e two weeks prior:
	Confirm the number of attendees and send a guest manifest with emergency contact information to Guest Services. Guest Manifest must minimally include: First/Last Name, Age, Emergency contact, Dietary Restrictions, and Reaction to the Dietary Restriction.
	Send name and copy of credentials of designated person with First Aid and CPR current certification to Guest Services.
	Designate person with Oregon Food Handlers Certificate (if using either McIver or Wilson Kitchens to prepare food for your group) and send to Guest Services. Print a copy so you can post in the kitchen.
	Create meal set-up / clean-up crew schedule.
	Create final day cleaning crews. Westwind will supply a cleaning checklist for your group ahead of time. Use this to break down your final day cleaning.
	Submit a copy of your group's insurance listing Westwind as an additional certificate holder.

	Confirm arrival, departure, meals, spaces being used and any other needs, with Guest Services.
	Confirm any special accommodations needed.

- Once date is confirmed, you will receive a contract. Sign and return with deposit by date indicated. You can make payments via check mailed to our Portland office, or online with Quickbooks. An invoice will be emailed to you.
- Contact your insurance company and request a certificate of insurance listing Westwind Stewardship Group as additional insured. It should read: Camp Westwind, 7500 N. Fraser Road, Otis, OR, 97368. you can email a copy to missy@westwind.org. Please indicate which reservation you are with.
- Send in your catering deposit.
- Confirm your final catering numbers, and send in final payments.
- Make you final rental payment.
- Make arrangements with Guest Services for any third-party service providers

OTHER HELPFUL INFORMATION FOR YOUR GROUP TO KNOW...

Parking

The Fraser Field Parking Area at Westwind has ample parking, however, we try to keep the amount of driving on our emergency access road to a minimum. Please advise your group to take the following steps

- Encourage group members to carpool or consider renting a bus.
- Unload gear quickly and park vehicles to clear room for others.
- Be prepared to walk the 2-mile dirt road. Keeping bug spray, water, snacks, and anything you may need right away.
- This is a good time for people to get to know each other. As the group leader, come up with some activities that can be done while walking down the road.
- The luggage truck will arrive approximately 30 minutes after the end of the arrival window. It will arrive behind Wilson Lodge (dining hall) to be unloaded.
- No early departures are allowed unless previously arranged before group arrival. We plan our logistics around your departure time.
- There is no in and out traffic throughout your stay. Bring everything you will need with you.

Smoking

Smoking is only permitted in one designated area on-site. The small bike shed next to the maintenance shop. Please dispose of cigarette butts appropriately. No smoking of marijuana is allowed at camp.

Alcohol

Alcohol is allowed in moderation. People are responsible for bringing and monitoring their own alcohol. Westwind prefers no glass. Please recycle your containers. All state and federal laws must be followed.



River - Beach Trail


Trail Distance 2 mile loop Time to Hike 45 minutes

Lost Lake Trail


Trail Distance **0.6 mile loop** Time to Hike **20 minutes**
